If you are age 65 or older on the last day of the tax year, you are allowed a higher amount of gross income before you are required to file a return. The table below lists the income limit amounts for the 2019 tax year.

^{*} If you turn 65 on January 1, 2020, you are considered to be age 65 at the end of 2019.

^{**} Gross income means all income you received in the form of money, goods, property, and services that is not exempt from tax, including any income from sources outside the United States (even if you may exclude part or all of it). Do not include Social Security benefits unless you are married filing a separate return and you lived with your spouse at any time during 2019.

^{***} If you did not live with your spouse at the end of 2019 (or on the date your spouse died) and your gross income was at least \$5.00, you must file a return regardless of your age.
